4. ***MFT track using it to increase neuropathy screening and preventing diabetes foot ulcers*** – Amanda Mooij

MFT track is a web-based app that brings a health care professional through the screening for neuropathy. It is a survey like app that records your assessment as you answer the questions. It walks you through using a tuning fork and a monofilament to complete testing for neuropathy. It provides you with health recommendations to share with your patient, a reminder for when this test is due again and a simple way to view results screen shot for your charts and results in the body of an email to send to the patients most responsible physician. The intent of this app is to decrease the duplicate information, getting information to physicians in real time, and continually screening for neuropathy to help our clients reduce the chance of developing diabetes foot ulcers. To help our clients reduce their risks of falling, reduce infections and amputations, and increase their awareness of their need for routine footcare and routine inspection of our feet.

10:30 – 11:15	Diabetic Foot Ulcers Perspectives from the Community - Dr. Janet Kuhnke In this session you will learn about the role of diabetic foot education. You will learn about the published results of foot care research in rural communities in Nova Scotia. The studies had two objectives. First, to understand how individuals living with diabetes access and apply foot health education to protect their feet from DM related foot complications Next, we sought to understand their experiences of accessing foot care and footwear services during the coronavirus pandemic. We used Semi-structured interviews were conducted with 27 (2 studies) adults living in the community who live with diabetes. People were recruited via word of mouth and social media. Data was transcribed verbatim and analyzed using a thematic approach. Findings were organized under themes: <ul style="list-style-type: none">▪ Inconsistent and multiple acquisition of sound diabetic foot health education from many practitioners▪ Footwear and foot care choices: Education takes a backseat to other factors and Foot Care expenses▪ Stress and fear: It is in my family background, and▪ Supports systems and family are important to the management of diabetes.
11:15 – 12:00	Assessing and treating the high-risk geriatric foot – Dr. Helen Rees Foot problems are common in older adults and associated with poorer physical function, falls, frailty, and reduced quality of life. This presentation will discuss the importance of physical examination of the feet as part of

	the routine assessment of older adults. We will discuss how Podiatrists and healthcare professionals can early detect foot problems and the importance of providing regular foot care to prevent further complications for the aging community and prevent falls.

We will share our journey of the mandatory advanced foot care training for all home care nurses. All training is based on best practice guidelines. With 30+ years of documented history we will share what worked well and some of our challenges and how they were overcome.</p>

8:30 – 9:15	<p>Screening Vulnerable Population for Risk of Developing Foot Complications - It is Everyone's Responsibility – Dr. Janet Kuhnke</p> <p>In this session you will learn about the role of screening feet for the risk of developing foot complications. We will review the role of Inlow's 60-second Foot Screen and having your team on board.</p> <p>At the end of this session, participants will be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Discuss risk factors for diabetic foot ulcer (DFU) and the importance of regular foot screenings in vulnerable populations ▪ Engaging your team ▪ Things that go well and things that do not go well and how we learn
9:15 – 10:00	<p>Foot dysfunctional biomechanics and associated painful foot symptoms - Dr. Norm Skjonberg</p> <p>This fast-paced presentation is to provide the Foot Care Nurse a different perspective regrading dysfunctional foot and ankle biomechanics that can contribute to medical conditions such as: weight bearing pes planus, hallux valgus deformity, Morton's Neuroma, hammer toes, plantar fasciitis, chronic instability from an ankle sprain and how the biomechanical dysfunction contributes to knee, hip, shoulder, and spine postural issues.</p>

	The objective is to provide information and hands on palpation skills that can be utilized in the Nurse's clinical practice and provide insight into obtaining a clinical impression that can be utilized in making an informed referral.

10:30 – 11:00	<p><i>Diagnosis of Onychomycosis: From Conventional Techniques and Dermoscopy and PCR to Artificial Intelligence – Dr. Irit Van-Ham</i></p> <p>Onychomycosis is a common fungal nail infection. Like most infections, accurate diagnosis is critical to deciding on the optimal course of treatment. As differential diagnosis may be difficult when based on appearance +/- clinical history alone, the use of a confirmatory laboratory test may be required to make an accurate diagnosis and treatment plan. Conventional diagnostic testing primarily consists of the potassium hydroxide test with in vitro culture to detect fungal species within nails. The success rate of this test, however, is limited by a high rate of false negative results. With the development of novel diagnostic tests, which use dermoscopy, reflectance confocal microscopy, artificial intelligence and PCR based modalities, the success rate of onychomycosis detection has increased. In this presentation Dr. Van-Ham will evaluate the current landscape of diagnostic techniques for onychomycosis, the role of novel technologies in clinical practice, and will share some insights from her current ongoing research and new developments.</p>
11:00 – 11:45	<p><i>Partners in Care: Orthotics as part of collaborative healthcare</i> - David Smith & Jillian Warden</p> <p>The many lower extremity problems associated with a pathological disorder often result in pain during ambulation, abnormal foot anatomy, and skin breakdown. The role of the orthotist in biomechanical management and offloading of pressure intolerant or abnormal feet is vital as part of a patient's care pathway. Orthotists offer expertise as relates to foot and ankle biomechanics, materials, and up to date conventional interventions available. Working with foot care practitioners, family physicians, surgeons, and physiotherapists; orthotists offer solutions which work in concert with wound care and rehabilitation. Connecting patients with the right information, education, and biomechanical intervention in a timely manner can result in wound reduction, increased comfort, and often prevention of further pathology including amputation. This presentation will discuss the role of the orthotist within the healthcare team, includes a primer on foot orthotic materials and offloading, and considerations in the treatment of a patient with foot problems and living with diabetes mellitus.</p>

1:00 – 1:45	<p><i>A unique position of Care – nursing science in foot care nursing</i> - Dr. Kate Clayton-Jones</p> <p>Foot care nurses are nurses whose specialty is the assessment and care of feet, not just nail care. They are nurses practicing nursing, which is a trained skill and licensure that is an integral part of the health care system and encompasses the promotion of health, prevention of illness, and the care of people and communities. Nursing science forms the scientific basis for the professional practice of nursing. What this science means to foot</p>

	<p>care nurses is the “why” and the “how” of practice. Some of the science is in other professions, and some is unique to nursing. The science is in our nursing care plans, assessments, interventions, communications, and documentation. Ours is an autonomous nursing practice and the science is the foundation and rationale of our work. However, different levels of nursing licensure, training and education augment or restrict scientific minded thinking and often nurses get caught up in tasks and doing, which hurts the advancement of our science and the voice of our profession. This talk is about lenses and mindsets that help us see our worth and work and how to get our discoveries and voices out there so that we build off of our knowledge and our foot care science is advanced beyond “the nurse is here to take care of your nails!”</p>
1:45 – 2:15	<p><i>Niagara College health students follow a ‘train-the-trainer’ approach to provide footcare clinics to unhoused population in Niagara Region –</i> Alexandra Jackson</p> <p>Niagara College (NC) Canada piloted a footcare program to address the needs and improve healthcare access for unhoused individuals. Built into the curriculum, NC students from interdisciplinary healthcare programs used a train-the-trainer model to provide footcare assessments to shelter clients within the Niagara Region. Students and supervising faculty hosted weekly footcare clinics at participating shelters and followed the Inlow’s Foot Assessment tool.</p> <p>This unique educational opportunity for NC healthcare students provides desperately needed access to footcare for unhoused individuals. In using a train-the-trainer model, this pilot project has been successful in providing student-led footcare assessments for unhoused individuals in the Niagara Region.</p>

Treatment techniques as well as adaptation of compression garments for various types of edema will be discussed.
